



DAILY ASSESSMENT OF STUDENT LEARNING: SUCCESSFUL MATH AND ENGLISH PROFESSOR COLLABORATION

One of the strengths of a smaller university campus is the tight-knit relationships that form across departments, often resulting in unique collaborative research opportunities. One such partnership resulted in an invitation to present interdepartmental research on elevating collegiate teaching outcomes at the Southern Association of College and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC).

Jana Anderson, Assistant Professor of English, and Dr. Ashley Cherry, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, were invited to present their joint findings on the best way to better serve their students. The duo was initially slated to present at the 2020 conference, but due to COVID-19 cancellations, their presentation has been rescheduled to the 2021 Institute.

"We were invited to present after our presentation at the SACSCOC Annual Meeting, which was in December 2019 in Houston, Texas," explained Dr. Cherry. "We led an interactive face-to-face workshop demonstrating and teaching participants the meaning of formative assessment."

"We have always known that giving students feedback is crucial to learning, and yet research tells us that it is the *timing* of the feedback and the ability to act upon the feedback that impacts learning most significantly," explained Professor Anderson. "However, in higher education, most of us have relied on high stakes summative assessment strategies (tests, papers) as our primary feedback tools—but these strategies for measuring learning provide little or no opportunity for the professor or the student to act upon misunderstandings or gaps in knowledge."

"So, we wondered: what would happen if we focused on formative assessment strategies every day in our classrooms to more effectively assess understanding? Would these strategies foster both transfer and deeper learning? Would these strategies more deeply and quickly engage students, lower the threat of failure, and take the focus from merely earning grades to a focus on deeper learning and comprehension?"

"Our experiences confirmed the research: regular, intentional formative assessment tools do make a positive difference, and so our goal in our presentation is to share what we learned and to focus on fast, fun, and frugal formative assessment tools that teachers can use in any discipline."

Their presentation was unique because typically, conference presentations resemble lectures at the front of the room with a set of PowerPoint slides. Dr. Cherry's and Professor Anderson's presentation looked distinctly different, as they sought to bring the interactive classroom environment into the conference room.


"Professor Anderson and I were encouraged by the positive feedback we received, and we were honored when the conference organizers invited us back to present at the Summer Institute," Dr. Cherry continued. "When someone is as passionate about teaching as I am, it's easy to collaborate and share ideas. While our classes and assignments may look different, our goal is the same. We both seek to form connections with students quickly, so that we can better teach them and help them succeed. Formative Assessment is a tool by which we both seek to meet our students where they are."

Professor Anderson agrees. "It's always fun to work with Dr. Cherry—she draws from a deep knowledge of her discipline and from a genuine passion to serve students and to help them learn and grow—and to help erase the math "fears" that plague so many. Collaboration is one of the hallmarks of good teaching," she added.

Professor Anderson and Dr. Cherry are scheduled to present their research in June 2021 at the SACSCOC Conference Summer Institute and are working to adapt their interactive presentation for an online format.

KENNETH HAWLEY, PH.D.: BOETHIUS REFERENCE WORK PUBLISHED

As co-editor of *Carmina Philosophiae*, the journal of the International Boethius Society, Dr. Kenneth Hawley, Professor of English at LCU, was given the opportunity to manage a special collection of texts related to Boethius (c. 480-524), the Late Roman philosopher and scholar. Before he passed in the summer of 2015, Professor Brian S. Donaghey of the University of Sheffield, UK, arranged for his personal library of old and rare editions and translations of Boethius's *Consolation of Philosophy* to be given to LCU. With the help of his colleague, Professor Harold Kaylor and the Boethius Society, Dr. Hawley established the Brian S. Donaghey Center for Boethian Studies at LCU in 2016.

In May of 2019, Brepols and the Arizona Center for Medieval and Renaissance Studies published a reference work on Boethius in English: <u>Remaking Boethius: The English Language Translation</u> <u>Tradition of *The Consolation of Philosophy*</u>, edited by Brian Donaghey, Noel Harold Kaylor, Jr., Philip Edward Philips, and Paul E. Szarmach, with assistance from Kenneth C. Hawley. Dr. Hawley had contributed material on various English translations for this volume, but after the passing of Donaghey, he was asked to help edit the final drafts of the book. This compendium accounts for every English version of Boethius's 6th-century Latin original, including not only the 24 complete translations from the 9th century to the 21st, but also 24 partial translations and a number of other spurious, mislabeled, or lost versions. The cover image on the book is from a 1695 translation in the LCU collection.

Thanks to the work of Honors Scholar Sarah Fantinel (Humanities) and to the Student Development Board and LCU's advancement office, the Boethius Center recently received a grant for a scanner to be used for digitizing many of the books from the collection—over 100 rare and fragile texts are being scanned and will be made available online to students and scholars around the world. This technology is facilitating the next phase of the center's work, bringing the largest private collection of Boethian texts to the public.

TEACHING AND PUBLISHING: PSYCHOLOGY AND COUNSELING DEPARTMENTS GOING STRONG

The Department of Psychology and Counseling has always had a reputation for challenging and engaging their students through effective pedagogical practices. Recently, those same faculty who teach in the classroom have also been publishing scholarly work. Several faculty members have conducted individual research and produced four book publications in the past year, as well as publishing journal articles and speaking in-person and digitally at conferences.

Dr. Carlos Perez, department chair and Associate Professor of Psychology and Counseling, lauded the university's approach to faculty research.

"Dr. Mills does a good job of sharing research or publications with the entire faculty," he explained. "It promotes this culture of uplifting publishing, research, and writing across the entire university. That's incredibly encouraging—we frequently get emails congratulating us on our book publications, research progress—it's something I see across campus. Our faculty do a great job with our students, and it is very gratifying to see them also pursuing scholarly work, which benefits the classroom experience."



He also shared how encouraging it is as a department chair to see this level of scholarship and success within each area of expertise. "It's great to see everyone working and devoted to their disciplines. My colleagues are showing what it means to be a scholar and a teacher. It is an honor to be the head of this team because there are so many good things happening, on top of the quality instruction that students receive."

Dr. Perez went on to highlight the variety of work that his colleagues are doing:

"Dr. Andy Young does a lot of frontline crisis and hostage negotiation," he explained, "and he wrote a highly-acclaimed book about hostage negotiation alongside a couple of other authors. *Crisis Negotiations: Managing Critical Incidents and Hostage Situations in Law Enforcement and Corrections* is a critical product of years of experience doing some of the hardest work out there."


"Dr. Shauna Frisbee recently published her book, *A Therapist's Guide to Treating Eating Disorders in a Social Media Age*, which really dives into social media and self-image. It's a great tool for therapists and clinicians, and it is such a timely publication for the world we live in."

"Another critical work published is Dr. Beth Robinson's Talking with Teens about Sexuality: Critical Conversations about Social Media, Gender Identity, Same-Sex Attraction, Pornography, Purity, Dating. It covers a wide range of topics, but also looks into sex trafficking, which is an area that is critical for therapists and support professionals."

"I also wrote a book about integrating therapy and

research in the same practice," he added, referencing his recent volume, *Integrating Postmodern Therapy and Qualitative Research.*

Dr. Perez emphasized that the department's scholarly contributions didn't stop at book publications, either. "We regularly present at conferences; Dr. Young and I wrote an article together; Dr. Frisbee, Dr. Robinson and I just submitted another article—we're investing in our field. This has always been a part of the program, but it's encouraging to see how much it's grown recently."

2020 L.R. SR. AND RUTH WILSON TEACHING AWARDS

There are many awards given at the culmination of each academic year to recognize individuals who have exceeded expectations and emerged as scholars and leaders on campus. Among these awards are the prestigious L.R. Sr. and Ruth Wilson Excellence in Teaching Award. Established by former LCU trustee, Dr. Ray Wilson, the award is in honor of his parents. L.R. Wilson, Sr. was a distinguished proponent of Christian education and a person whose lifelong example illustrates the personal and professional mission of changing lives. Each year the award is presented to two faculty members at spring commencement for their commitment to living out this mission through their work in Christian education.



"Mathematics and Christianity have several aspects in common. The biggest is the idea of axioms. In mathematics these are statements that you must accept as true without proof. Most people would correlate these with faith. There are some unsolved and unsolvable problems in mathematics. I tell students that if we had all the answers then we would not need faith. Mathematics is a universal language. It is the same, no matter your country of origin or your beliefs. It can be the spark to start a conversation about faith. We train a lot of math educators, and we tell them that they may be the only Jesus some students ever encounter."

Assistant Professor and Secondary Education Program Coordinator "In the LCU School of Education, we routinely hear back from area principals and superintendents who have hired one of our graduates, commenting on the stark difference between our graduates and others they hire. One principal told me, "I know that when I hire an LCU graduate I'm not just hiring a quality 'educator' but a 'Christian educator' who sees our mission in education and what we do with kids and families in a different way than others." This is the heart of what we do here at LCU—we want our teachers to not only be trained in the best pedagogical practices, but we also strive to instill in them the importance of "why" we do what we do. It is a calling; it is our mission. I remind them often they are light in a dark world, and we must share that light each day we step into a classroom."

LCU ASSISTANT PROFESSOR CHERRY AT OXFORD

Dr. Ashley Cherry, Assistant Professor of Mathematics at LCU, became the second LCU faculty member to be selected to a prestigious cohort hosted by the Scholarship and Christianity in Oxford (SCIO) institute. The cohort had previously been an on-campus fellowship but was changed to an on-line cohort during the pandemic.

SCIO's Webinar Course on Science, Christianity, and Society represents a new, webinar-based approach to teaching and learning on the timely topic of science's intersections with broader societal forces, and especially its interactions with Christianity. Two cohorts—the first, early career faculty members from member institutions of the Council for Christian Colleges & Universities (CCCU), and the second, selected postdoctoral researchers at the University of Oxford—join leading scholars to examine the larger social and cultural contexts within which science is located, reflecting on specific intersections between science and those contexts.

"I am extremely grateful that I am able to participate in this program," shared Dr. Cherry. "When I applied for a webinar series, I wasn't sure what to expect, but it has been a wonderful experience, and I've learned so much and met many wonderful people in the process."

Fraculty Scholarship

When asked to describe the format of this SCIO opportunity, Dr. Cherry explained it as the best book club she had ever encountered. The cohort met via Zoom once a month and included assigned readings between meetings.

"When we did get to meet virtually, instead of just discussing what we thought the authors meant, we got to meet the authors themselves!" shared Dr. Cherry, emphasizing the rarity of that opportunity. "While all of our readings focused on science and religion," she continued, "each month we gained insight from a different field's perspective."

The authors included sociologists, historians, scientists, Bible scholars, philosophers, and theologians, and each presenter and author brought unique expertise to the discussion, explaining his or her particular interactions between the realms of science and religion. The group didn't shy away from any conflicts that were present and searched for ways to reconcile those conflicts and bridge the gaps between the fields.

The experience has been a global opportunity for Dr. Cherry. "I have been able to meet with 8-10 other early career STEM faculty working at CCCU institutions across the country, in addition to the session organizers from Oxford (the director of SCIO, Dr. Stan Rosenberg, and Dr. Pete Jordan), and the speakers/authors from across the globe," she shared. "I'm grateful to learn from such a diverse and brilliant group of scholars."

Not only has this opportunity allowed her to explore other perspectives on faith—it has also helped Dr. Cherry gain a new appreciation for integrating faith into the mathematics classroom experience she crafts with her students.

"At LCU, we seek to bring our faith into everything we do," she explained. "However, sometimes it can be difficult to see how to bring faith into the math or science classroom because over the course of history, these fields seem to have grown apart—and traditionally, they are studied separately. It can be easy to teach an entire STEM class without mentioning faith at all—after all, the Pythagorean Theorem is true regardless of my Christian beliefs. But I believe it is critical that our students know that our faith is an inextricable part of who we are. And oftentimes, students may be concerned about conflicts they see between science and religion."

"If it seems that science says one thing and scripture says another, what should they do? If they read something about science disproving religion or religion disproving science, where do they go to find answers? What do they do with the uncomfortable questions? Do students have a safe place to go to ask their questions without fear of judgment or ridicule? I think it is critical that we do not dismiss students' questions or doubts, but that we are willing to listen to their questions and help them as they seek to understand who God is and what their purpose is in this world."

"If students have questions for me about what I believe, I now have not only my own beliefs and understanding of scripture and science, but I also have learned different perspectives from multiple Christian theologians and historians, as well as Christians who work in the STEM fields," she added. "Understanding multiple perspectives helps us to meet our students where they are so we can help them wrestle with the hard questions they may face. I think that going through this program prepared me to serve my students better. Teaching students mathematics is important to me, but nurturing students' faith in God is also a priority, and my hope is that I can use what I have learned to help students grow both in knowledge and in faith."

LCU STUDENT PUBLISHED IN INTERNATIONAL JOURNAL

The success of faculty mentorship in LCU's undergraduate research program is illustrated through a recent publication titled "A Contemporary Perspective on Undergraduate Research Mentoring in University Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences Programs"—authored by LCU undergraduate student Blake Thornton and his team of mentors in the Department of Natural Sciences, Drs. Bart Durham, Doug Swartz, and Andy Laughlin.

Published in the international journal *Fisheries*, this article examined successful approaches and practices to existing undergraduate research and mentoring programs and created a new model for success in that endeavor. Blake Thornton, the lead author of the paper, is a 2018 graduate of Lubbock Christian University, where he earned a B.S. in Natural Resources Ecology and Conservation (NRC), and he is currently working toward his master's degree studying aquatic parasite ecology at Angelo State University. Blake also presented his work internationally at the Southern Division of The American Fisheries Society Annual Meeting held before the pandemic in Puerto Rico.

Dr. Durham shared, "Blake is the first student in this degree program to be a lead author on a peer-reviewed publication, which is a testament to both his research and writing ability and to the continued growth and maturity of the NRC degree program at LCU."

LCU TO LAUNCH WELCH ACADEMY FOR PEANUT RESEARCH

Dr. Julie Marshall, LCU professor of chemistry and biochemistry, has worked with the Welch Foundation to form the new Welch Academy, which is aimed to give younger college students laboratory experience and the chance to learn skills that will be useful later for their research projects. The academy will launch in 2021.

Dr. Marshall herself has worked with about 50 undergraduates over the years. Students typically shadow a professor for up to a year as sophomores, and then are ready to begin a research project in the summer session as juniors before finishing up the following spring with a presentation of their work. At any given time, five to 10 students are participating, with nine taking part in 2020.

UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH OPPORTUNITIES

With funding from the Welch Foundation, Dr. Marshall incorporates research into LCU's chemistry and biochemistry degree plans either through an internship or by working with a professor on a project—but not all undergraduate research at LCU is in the sciences. In fact, undergraduate research opportunities are available across LCU's campus, and students from every academic department across the campus routinely engages undergraduates in collaborative, scholarly research.

"These opportunities give undergraduates extensive hands-on experience and exposure to critical thinking," Dr. Marshall explained. "It also gives them a competitive advantage in the job market or when applying to graduate school."

Each year, students present quality research at conferences across the country, including LCU's own Scholars Colloquium, and at the National Conference for Undergraduate Research (NCUR). In 2020, a diverse group of 16 students and 5 faculty members were slated to present at NCUR in Bozeman, MT, before the conference was cancelled due to COVID-19 concerns.



RESEARCH ON MORAL DEVELOPMENT IN YOUTH: A BY-PRODUCT OF VOCATI

The Vocati Institute, LCU's Missional Youth Theology initiative, brings together an interdisciplinary group of experienced Christian leaders with high-school-aged students to inform, prepare, and encourage them for lifetimes of theological exploration, spiritual discernment, and faithful engagement in their churches and communities. Vocati creates a formal mentoring opportunity for young people who feel God's calling in their lives, encouraging them to dig deeper alongside a group of seasoned Christians who are experienced in assisting with spiritual formation.

In 2020, the institute announced their renewal of funding through a five-year extension of the generous grant from the Lilly Endowment, Inc., with the goal of helping the institute grow to a self-sustaining model—a key step in cementing the program's work.

"Vocati is an initiative to train leaders for the church of tomorrow in the context of our secular society," explained Dr. Jesse Long, the Vocati Program Advisor. "Vocati is Latin for vocation—what we're trying to do is to prepare leaders for the churches of tomorrow who understand their calling, no matter the discipline. Vocation is not, from a Christian perspective, specific it's a way of life. We're trying to expose these students to things that help them internalize what it means to live for God and for His missional practice."

A large part of the work that Vocati does is measuring and tracking its participants' moral development and spiritual formation, both before, during, and after their participation within the program. Dr. Jeremy Smith, the Vocati Program Coordinator, explained, "The first question we look at is, 'What is going on?' We lean into this idea of priestly listening—what is God doing in our context? Where is the kingdom of God being fulfilled, or where is there a lapse in the kingdom of God? And then the second question we reflect on is, 'What ought to be going on?' exploring the theological question of, if God's kingdom were unfolding as it should, what would be happening? The students actually craft this theological norm that they then are going to embody. And so, the last question is, 'How might we respond? How do I, as a Christian, now understanding this theology, determine what should be going on in this particular context? How do I live into that context faithfully?' Through this, we're seeing students for the first time thinking more about God and a more active way-seeing that He is actually working, not just kind of passive and off somewhere else. I think at the core, we're emphasizing spiritual discernment."

Aside from the benefits to the program's participants, the Vocati Institute has also served as the basis for research into spiritual development. Dr. JoAnn Long, the Vocati Program and Research Director, has presented "Adolescent Moral Development: Effects of Engaging Youth in the Critical Appraisal of Theological Content" at the 29th International Nursing Research Congress in Calgary, Alberta, Canada, in July 2019, and "Impact of a Youth Theological Institute on Moral Development: Findings from Vocati Cohort 2" at the 28th International Nursing Research Congress in Melbourne, Australia in July 2018. Dr. Long has also submitted another proposed presentation for the Association of Youth Ministry Educators in Dallas, Texas, currently scheduled for October 2021.

"It's really interesting," she shared, "because our students are an interprofessional group of people it's not just Bible scholars. We have behavioral scientists, nursing students, and so many other areas represented, which is fantastic to have these young people exposed to Christian role models who may be in different disciplines but are still pursuing the life of God in Christ."



RESEARCH WITH FULLER YOUTH INSTITUTE

Dr. David Fraze was recently appointed as the James A. "Buddy" Davidson Charitable Foundation Youth and Family Ministry Endowed Chair, which was made possible by a million-dollar gift to permanently support a faculty position, offer resources for faculty development and research, and provide scholarships for students. In his new position, Dr. Fraze continues to teach and mentor the next generation of youth ministers, while also conducting research, writing, and providing support for churches and youth ministers across the country.

Dr. Fraze is currently working on a research project with the Fuller Youth Institute at Fuller Theological Seminary. The research will provide insight into how effective Churches of Christ are in practicing the "Six Core Competencies" found to be evident in growing churches. The competencies were discovered as a result of Fuller Youth Institute's historical "Growing Young" research project, which was published by the same title in 2016. Dr. Fraze's research marks a first in the "Growing Young" research project, as the first time a specific denominational group has conducted a meta-analysis for analysis and application. The project is nearing completion, but early results and application have already been presented at the National Conference on Youth Ministry held January 2021 in Daytona, Florida.


DR. SNEED CONTRIBUTES TO HANDBOOK ON MONSTERS IN THE BIBLE

Dr. Mark Sneed, Professor of Bible, has a forthcoming article in the *Oxford Handbook of Biblical Monsters.* "My article on Behemoth will appear in one of the famous Handbooks by Oxford University Press," he explained. "They are considered to be reference works for both undergraduate and graduate research." Dr. Sneed also has forthcoming articles on the wisdom literature more generally in two other similar handbooks: *The Cambridge Companion to the Wisdom Literature* and *The Oxford Handbook of Wisdom and the Bible.*

Dr. Sneed reflected on the role that his research has played on his teaching. "In particular, my research on the monstrous beasts has helped me to convey to students the place of disorder and chaos in God's divine economy. In other words, it has helped me to explain to students why God allows evil to exist in the world, what is called a theodicy. These beasts form an important role in the theology of the Bible."

Dr. Sneed's elevated work in the field of Old Testament study has earned him a reputation as a top-tier biblical scholar—an effort that is a testament to the culture at LCU. "At every meeting where I present and with every publication that I produce, the name Lubbock Christian University always appears, which brings LCU worldwide, academic publicity. I am very fortunate to represent LCU abroad and am tremendously grateful to LCU for its support throughout the years."

DOES GENDER MATTER IN BILINGUAL CONTEXTS? – DR. PAHOM RESEARCH REVEALED

Dr. Olga Pahom, Associate Dean of LCU's Honors College and Assistant Professor of Linguistics and Cultural Studies, was the Keynote speaker at the Caliche 2020 Conference, hosted by Texas Tech University and the Graduate Society of Applied Linguistics. Her presentation entitled "Does Gender Matter in Bilingual Contexts?" explored the relationship between language and gender.

"Gender is a ubiquitous feature in our social world, and it is implicitly embedded into our institutions, interactions, and language choices," explained Dr. Pahom, "but does gender matter in contexts where more than one language is used?"

Dr. Pahom presented evidence from two studies that looked at gender as a variable in bilingual settings. The results of both studies suggested that gender may play a role in bilingual settings but discovered that further study will require varied methodologies and assessments. The presentation also discussed the strategic value of further research on gender and bilingualism using current theoretical frameworks in gender and language studies and offered pedagogical considerations for the L2 classroom.

"I presented two studies," she explained. "The first, which I published a few years ago, was a second-language-acquisition study where we went in various Spanish classrooms and taught vocabulary words. We tested the students, specifically looking to see if gender had an effect on the kinds of words that they remembered and recalled better—it's a topic with a lot of controversial results. In our study, we found that males tested significantly better than females, which was really interesting because a lot of research has reported that women perform better on linguistic type tests."

"The second study I presented is one that's part of my dissertation, which focuses on the storytelling practices of bilingual couples how they talk to each other, how they tell stories during conversations. We looked at gender effects and found a lot of differences in how men and women initiate, tell, and respond to their interlocutor's stories."

Even as her work is recognized at such a high level, Dr. Pahom plans to continue exploring these relationships. "This research has implications across so many areas: couples and marriages, how we tell stories, how we respond to national discussions, who gets to tell stories in our society, whose stories get heard, and how we respond to stories told by men and women. It's an incredibly important area of study."



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
